#### Give-up-itis

"They died for no reason!" the doctors asserted. During the Korean war some POWs (prisoners-of-war) developed extreme apathy, gave up hope, relinquished the will to live, and simply died, despite no obvious organic cause. Medical officers documented that these soldiers retreated further into themselves, refused to get any exercise, and eventually lay down as if waiting to die. This 'fatal withdrawal' was not a result of physical causes. The formal term 'give-up-itis' (GUI) was originally applied during the Korean war (1950-1953). 'Give-up-itis' was carried forward to describe the same behavior occurring in POW camps in Vietnam as well. The phenomenon has also been observed by shipwreck survivors where trauma victims in life-rafts are reported to have given up and died from despair.


Give-up-itis is not limited to soldiers or severe trauma victims, it is also prevalent particularly in post-retirement populations. Time magazine notes that when elderly men lose a spouse, they are 70% more likely to pass away within a year, while data from the National Council on Aging reduces the timeframe to about 90 days. Corresponding aspects are noted in retirees who move from productive careers into the relative ease of retirement. They often have a "bucket list" of things to do when they retire, but that list is soon achieved and the listlessness of living a life without purpose or identifiable goals takes its toll. Lack of exercise leads relatively soon to physical atrophy and loss of physical strength and dexterity. Loss of goals and purpose lead to cognitive decline.

Bibleville is a great solution to retirement doldrums! Biblebelieving Christians can develop deep friendships with fellow believers and make a significant contribution to the ongoing program of God in their retirement years. This ministry is designed to provide ministerial purpose for those who want to make a difference for God in retirement. Opportunities to put physical abilities, skilled experience, and spiritual passion to work for eternal purposes abound in this place! On a cold and dreary winter day

throughout most of the United States and Canada, a person might ask, "Why would I want to go to Bibleville?" They hear on the news that Texas is also experiencing cold

weather and storms. Well, Dallas and Fort Worth are the big cities that usually have bad weather like that. And they are about 500 miles north of Bibleville, where our short winter season is more like fall. The next question one often hears

is, "What is there to do there?" The short answer is, "Many of the same things as are done at parks in Arizona and Florida." But the big difference is that Bibleville is distinctly Biblically oriented. This

orientation and the opportunity to serve through music are what drew my wife and me to Bibleville. From November first through March thirty-first, there are worship services every Sunday morning and evening. Throughout the entire

year, there are worship services on

etcetera, there are opportunities to glorify God and edify the body with those skills.

For instrumentalists and singers, there are musical jams on Tuesday evenings, unless there is a conference that week. There are generally about twenty musicians and an audience of 50-250 that gather to celebrate God through Christian music. For musicians who would like to play that old guitar, banjo, ukulele, trombone, or band/ orchestra instrument, they can join the Glory Band. This is a musical ensemble to revive those old skills from junior or senior high school and play roughly fifty-five pieces of Christian music in the winter season. If all you desire is to be part of the audience, there are gospel concerts with invited artists every Saturday afternoon and evening through January and February.


There are groups who travel to destinations out of the park for everything from tours of local attractions to participation in sports like hunting, fishing, golfing, bowling, bird watching, Christmas light displays, and shopping. We have an active outreach ministry where Bibleville residents hand out Bible tracts at the local flea market, tutor at local schools, or help students at Rio Grande Bible College practice English conversation. And of course, there are many who join with friends and go out to eat. Yummm.

If you prefer staying closer to home, there are groups of people who do quilting, prepare VBS craft kits, serve others through hospitality, or repair broken items in homes. Other activities are: pickle ball, shuffleboard, fitness classes, walking, bike riding, assembling scripture booklets with John and Romans, stained glass projects, and Friday evening card and board games. A layette ministry prepares gifts of clothing and supplies for new babies born to couples studying at the Bible College. A fancy tea event for women is held during each conference. Community dinners are a regular event. There are special events for veterans, like an annual breakfast and a flag retirement. Overall, this is a Christian community that cares for

and serves others. (If I have missed your favorite activity, I apologize.)



Ron and Esther Heath have been coming to Bibleville for a while. A number of years ago when we were still in Rochester, Minnesota, they invited us to visit them here. We had a great time and enjoyed the ministry. Then, two years ago, Dave Lightner called and asked if we would come to Bibleville to see the ministry and consider whether God would have us work as chaplain. So, last year we spent November and December getting to know the ministry and the people.

Bibleville has an incredible opportunity. Dr. Larry Windle has a heart for Spanish-speaking people. But he also has a heart for missions throughout the world. The students at Rio Grande Bible College are being trained to reach people from other cultures. We are witnesses to God's workings with ministry teams being sent out through Rio Grande Bible Ministries.

Peggy and I spent an afternoon with Dr. Windle, and we left having caught some of his excitement for God's work in those students. Our first ministry at Bibleville is to encourage and support that great work. We are to be vessels of prayer for the faculty and for the students. 


people around the world. Our ministry included helping that school and those students financially and to get to know them personally and to be a part of their lives with carefulness and purposefulness.

Secondly, we have over a million Spanish-speaking people throughout the Rio Grande Valley. The numbers are growing. We are so thankful for the radio ministries that are broadcasting the good news of Jesus Christ to people in Mexico and Texas. God loves them, and so must we. I was really impressed with the heart of some who attend the flea market every week and pass out tracks. It is a great outreach because of the incredible amount of people who attend there each week.

God will bless His Word. I believe that there are only two eternal things in this world: The Word of God and people. Our purpose is summed up in saying that God desires us to get those two things together! He wants us to get His Word to these people. God is working in the lives of those who hear His Word. I appreciated the outreach of the school to neighbors in having a rummage sale inside the gate of Bibleville. The Mexicans who have come to this country as a group are very polite. They are respectful of the elderly and we are elderly. They have needs, and their greatest need is to know the Lord.

Thirdly, we can't do as much as we once did. We may not have a lot to give, but the people in Bibleville give of themselves. They give time to put Bibles together. They give time to work on Vacation Bible School crafts. Peggy and I had a great time in fellowshipping with those doing these "small tasks." But I am convinced that there is no such thing as a small task with the Lord. He took a young boy's "small lunch" and multiplied it to meet the physical needs of 5,000 men, not counting women and children who were also there. We don't know how that impacted the multitude, but in a few weeks after the ascension of Jesus, 3,000 were saved on the day of Pentecost, and a short time after that, 5,000 men (not counting women and children) were saved. There may have been as many as 10,000 people saved in less than a month, perhaps less than a week. Why? It wasn't just because of the preaching of Peter. It was because of the faith of 120 who were praying. It was because a crippled man was healed. It was because the Lord had met needs (some small needs) of people for three years. I am impressed with the people of Bibleville. I am really impressed with the students at Rio Grande. I know that God has brought us together "for such a time as this."







Bibleville is a division of Rio Grande Bible Ministries and is a support group of the ministry of Rio Grande Bible College, upholding the same doctrinal statement. Even though we are a "fifty-five-plus" community, the available ministries are vast and varied, with evangelism and spiritual growth being the two priority areas. More than fifty people live here as full-time Texas residents, and usually from November through April each year, another 300 migrate to our warm winter climate as "Winter Texans." Since we are an allvolunteer group, no one at Bibleville receives a salary. We are kept busy with the groundskeeping and overall maintenance and upkeep of our forty acres, where nearly 130 mobile homes and 70 RV hook-up sites are located.

With the arrival of thousands of Winter Texans here in the Rio Grande Valley, many of our retired pastors and missionaries are invited to other mobile parks to lead Bible studies and services. Bibleville earns its reputation as a conference center because we have five Bible conferences (Sundays through Fridays) with outstanding speakers, which many people throughout the Valley attend. Our large auditorium, with the capacity of 750 people, works well for our Bible conferences and to accommodate the very popular Saturday music concerts in January and February. In addition, regular Sunday services, Tuesday morning Bible

Studies, and Thursday night prayer meetings are held from November through March.

We came to Bibleville in 2010, with our aching and aging joints, to escape the frigid North in exchange for sunny South Texas. Like many of our residents, we heard from a friend about the advantages and possibilities available here. We soon found that, in addition to the great climate, we were immediately impressed by the friendship and family atmosphere in this Christian community and its many opportunities for retirees to be involved in the Lord's work.

Since Rio Grande Bible College is only six miles away, there are many opportunities to minister there and to have personal contact with Bible College students from more than twenty countries. Some residents enjoy giving campus tours to new Bibleville arrivals, tutoring students, or participating in joint venture projects with students, faculty, and winter volunteers. Even though work opportunities abound, we still manage to take time for the one-hour trip to the beach at Padre Island, in the Gulf of Mexico, or a boat trip on the Rio Grande River thirty minutes away. Others enjoy bird watching (this is a main Corridor for North American migratory fowl), a trip to Space X, as well as organized day trips to points of interest in this diverse multicultural area.




#### **IKE FRIESEN MEMORIAL TRIBUTE**

# PASSING TRUTH to the NEW GENERATION



#### "GRANDPA, LOOK! I got a

robot for my birthday!" As I look at the animated toys and electrical gadgets my grandkids play with, I think back to the handmade slingshots, the balsa wood gliders I used to make, the roads I would build in the dirt for my Matchbox cars, and the tree houses we assembled. I wonder if today's kids will embrace the biblical values I hold so dear and declare them to their generation. I echo the psalmist's prayer in Psalm 71:17 and 18: "O God, You have taught me from my youth; And to this day I declare Your wondrous works. Now also when I am old and grey-headed, O God, do not forsake me, Until I declare Your strength to this generation, Your power to everyone who is to come."

I find myself humming the song that Dave Fenley sings:

Grandpa, tell me 'bout the good old days.

Sometimes it feels like this world's gone crazy.

And, Grandpa, take me back to yesterday,

When the line between right and wrong didn't seem so hazy.

Barna estimates that roughly 70% of high school students who enter college as professing Christians will leave with little to no faith. These students usually don't return to their faith. 80% of those reared

in the church will be "disengaged" by age 29. ii

Principally, studies indicate that Christians who "lose their faith" frequently never had much confidence in it to begin with. The current data show that those who jettison Christianity have already begun to fade earlier but only admitted it at a later time. We likely lost them while they were still in church under our watch. "

God intends for us to pass on our faith to the next generation—not just knowledge of it, but faith itself.

#### **AUTHORITY SOURCES**

We've always had two generations interacting with each other, but now we have distinct cultures between the generations and little interaction taking place. Traditionally, when the events of life occurred, the individual processed the event with family, classmates, colleagues, or church members...the de facto support groups or processing centers. Today people have begun instantly processing life's events in this electronic world with a selected group of "friends" or by "google searching" and accepting the results as truth. This has effectively replaced the traditional center of truth and values.

These same groups and digital influences now dictate the meaning of words and methods of expression. Many no longer find the need to communicate with older generations because they can process life exclusively with those of similar interests...or struggles... or doubts. Words take on new meaning, and communication is not developed to include other social groups. This effectively isolates the social groups from one another.

Patterns of thinking were predicated on the foundation of a Creator God and a reasonably common moral standard, but the paradigm has effectively shifted to assume that humans exist by chance and must determine their own value systems.

This disconnect has birthed a humanistic foundation for society. The first notable redefinition is tolerance. All values, beliefs, lifestyles, and claims to truth are equal. Removing the Divine reference point, the argument arises that no individual can claim, "Your thoughts aren't as good as mine; your beliefs are less than mine." Essentially everyone has the right to claim an individual system of truth, and there is no objective standard revealed by God.

Another newly defined word is multiculturalism. This applies the tenet of tolerance to culture. All cultures with their values, beliefs, and lifestyles are equally valid, even if they include immoral or oppressive aspects.

A third reformulation is diversity. Different values,

beliefs, lifestyles, and claims to truth—all are equal. Thus, no individual is entitled to his or her own opinion. One must embrace all perspectives as though they were equally true, no matter how absurd or offensive they may be.

Sociologists refer to our day as a quantum shift in culture. How can we transmit the truth and make Jesus-followers of all nations?

We begin by reaffirming that God's answers to life apply to every generation, even this one.

The Scriptures have been divinely communicated and are the objective standard for every generation. Read, teach, and explain the Bible in everyday life.

The Gospel remains the same for every generation. Salvation is only by grace through faith in the person and completed redemptive sacrifice of Jesus, the Godman. Declare the message of reconciliation with God and fellowship with others.

The Throne of Grace is the means for divine intervention in our lives and ministerial efforts. Pray regularly for this world, your children and grandchildren.

The Church remains God's tool of choice to meet the deepest need of every generation in this age. Go, participate, and take those you influence with you.

Hope is as bright as the faithfulness of God.
